## LET'S TALK . . . A CALL FOR STATE REUNIONS

A STORY WE ALL KNOW: by VFA President Jacqui Ceballos

Feminism didn't die after the suffrage amendment became part of the Constitution. -- it just fell into a deep sleep. A few determined women, led by the magnificent Alice Paul, continued to plug away for an Equal Rights Amendment, and with each new generation they were joined by a few more.

But nothing much happened until 1963. "The That's when Feminine Mystique" stirred thousands women. Catherine East of Washington, DC, one of the stalwarts who'd tried to sow the seeds in an infertile soil was overjoyed. There was a movement out there. When she met Betty Friedan, she was certain Betty could lead it. The story of how this led to the founding of NOW is told by Betty in her book, "It Changed My Life."

Around the same time younger women in the anti war and civil rights movements were beginning to organize. Amy Kesselman, Heather

Booth, Naomi Weisstein, Vivian Rothstein. Freeman and others started the first radical feminist group in Chicago. When Jo's newspaper, The Voice of Women's Liberation, took off, the movement had a name. Soon WLM groups were popping up in cities and colleges all over the country.

By 1975, the work of feminists had transformed the lives of women and men in the USA and it's effects reached around the globe. As Muriel Fox, VFA's board chair puts it, "No other social revolution has ever been so broadly all-encompassing as the wave feminist second revolution. The main reason for this impact is the role played by thousands of passionate individual "leaders who made it happen."

VFA's main goal is to reach those women, who, by the 1980's were scattered far and wide. We must get their stories out. And that is what the PIONEER DIRECTORY is doing. For several years,

Barbara Love and her crew of intrepid sleuthers have searched, found and written up their bios. But many more remain to be found

What's the best way to find missing feminists? By holding state regional events, of course! Louisiana (where VFA (See State Reunions, page 2)

## WE CELEBRATE DELL WILLIAMS

**VFA** will hold reception to honor Dell Williams on the publication of her book, Revolution in the Garden. The event will

take place at Carole De Saram's loft at 76 Laight Street in New York, Sunday, October 30.


Dell is not only a founder of VFA she actually wrote the first check for organization

in July of 1992. This kind of positive enthusiasm has been her hallmark since the day she signed up as a cardcarrying feminist.

Her activism began in 1970, when, she says. stepped into the August 26, 1970 Womens's March for Equality like a lamb and walked out like a lion. A male colleague in my Fifth Avenue office had made a derogatory remark about the women lining up on the Avenue and 'click,' I

got it. It suddenly came to me that growing up in our male- dominated culture had limited me financially, psychologically and

emotionally. I rushed down to the street and ioined the march and that very day signed up to join the New York Chapter of NOW. For



In 1972, Dell organized the first women's sexuality conference. Over 1400 women showed up to talk about their experiences, which included everything from sexual harassment to molestation by fathers and brothers. At the opening speakout Betty Dodson, noted sexologist, gave a forthright talk and

# A MODEL FOR REUNION EVENTS IN OTHER STATES

The April 2005 VFA-Conn event is a model for one-state events, just as the August 2004 Midwest event was a model for the multi-state events. Planning began shortly after the November

2004 election in which "values" putatively won the day for the Republicans. Amy Kesselman, a member of the planning committee and author of a forthcoming book on New Haven Women's Liberation, proposed that we call our VFA retrospective "Feminism and its Values." Like the Midwest planners, we met monthly, very much an intergenerational planning group, and by conference call. In addition, we very early established a list serve and, pushed by our younger members, Jenine Gorman and Meg Dubois, a VFA-CONN web site. Later, we noted that half our registrations were downloaded from the website; half came from our printed brochure.

Another significant feature of the Connecticut event was the collaboration of a number of feminist organizations still in operation, most of whom recognize that they owe their existence to the 1970s activists we were planning to honor.

To make the event as professional looking as possible, we printed stationery, envelopes and mailing labels and held it in a hotel conference center with all the service that such a venue can provide. Helen Pearl, co-chair, made sure everything went right and in the end increased Connecticut membership in VFA by 30. Ginny Blaisdell, a professional photographer and graphic artist, contributed her skills, and Kate Swift, Connecticut author of Words and Women, her editing skills, to produce the conference booklet, now a permanent record of the committee's research into the history and dramatis personae of Connecticut's incredible Second Wave.

Day-long panels on reproductive rights, women at work, and feminism and popular culture, set the stage and the mood for the typically somewhat chaotic Awards Dinner. Not typical was the way the awards dinner ended: with a performance of the New Haven Women's Liberation Rock Band – reconstituted, with tears and joy, for the occasion.

immediately transformed the women from body-shy to body-proud. For two days, workshops were held covering every subject relating to sexuality. The conference was a rousing success.

In 1974, Dell created Eve's Garden, a women's sex boutique, to help women "define, explore and celebrate" their sexuality. EVE represented all women and the Garden was symbolic of women taking responsibility for their own bodies. The shop was the first of its kind and today has its own web site.

Dell was born in the Bronx in 1923, not long after women won the vote. Her early years were fun – her mother was a star tennis player, her father a successful businessman. Life was good until the great Depression when poverty disrupted her family's life. Acting and singing kept her going during these difficult years, and she nurtured an ambition for a career on the stage.

Then came World War II. She joined the U.S. Army and, while stationed in Mississippi, wrote and acted in a stage production. Its success prompted the Army to create a theater group, and she spent the war years performing at USO's around the country.

After the war she did everything from being an artist's model to assisting the legendary producer Norman Corwin in Hollywood. In the 1950's she was censured by the FBI for her work defending The Hollywood Ten from charges of Communism. She subsequently entered the New York advertising world and soon rose to the top.

Dell's remarkable life is told in a warm and touching manner in "Revolution in the Garden: Memoirs of the Gardenkeeper" which she wrote with Lynn Vannucci. VFA members may get an autographed copy of her book at the October 30th event, or through the mail. Price is \$22.95. Ten percent of the sale of each book will go to VFA. (see enclosed form).

In 2004, Dell took part in the great March for Women's Lives in Washington, D.C.: "I'll tell you what, she says, at 82 I'm pretty damned tired of having to tread this same ground all over again." But, in her usual enthusiastic and hopeful manner, she reminds us "No battle was ever won overnight. We just have to make sure we don't stop trying."

# And We Mourn...



Minnette Doderer a state representative and a leading advocate of women's rights during her 25-year career in the state legislature died August 12 in Iowa City at age 82.

Her work on rape law reform, the federal and state Equal Rights

Amendments, juvenile justice, childcare, and inheritance tax revision resulted in many laws that improved the legal status of women.

As president pro tempore of the Senate for two years, she attained the highest position ever held by a woman in the Iowa Legislature. Minette was one of the founding members of the Iowa Women's Political Caucus and co-chair of the International Women's Year coordinating committee.

In 1975, she was chair of the Iowa delegates to the United Nations meeting in Houston. Featured in the book *More Strong Minded Women*, by Louise Noun. She was inducted into the Iowa Women's Hall of Fame in 1979.

Minnette was the recipient of numerous awards. VFA honored Minette at the National Women's Party house in Washington, DC in 1999. She is survived by a daughter and son, grandson and great granddaughter.

Molly Yard

NOW PRESIDENT
FROM 1987 TO 1991
The indomitable Molly
Yard died on Wednesday,
Sept. 21, in Pittsburgh.



Born in 1912 to Methodist missionaries living in China, she remembered that her father's Chinese friends gave him an ornate brass bowl as a "commiseration gift" on the birth of a daughter—symbolic of women's position in the world. Shaped by a childhood in China, where women had second-class status, she worked tirelessly during her life to achieve equality for all people.

Her activism began as a student at Swarthmore College when she led the fight to abolish the fraternity system, which discriminated against minority students. She later worked with Dr. Dorothy Height to integrate the YWCA. While at Swarthmore, she wrote to President Franklin Roosevelt and Eleanor Roosevelt about an issue that had angered many students. Eleanor Roosevelt invited her over, and Yard became a regular advisor to the First Lady.

Molly was a regional campaign manager for John F. Kennedy's 1960 presidential run and the Western Pennsylvania coordinator for Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s "I Have a Dream" march in 1963. She was heavily involved in the civil rights movement until 1974, when she joined Pittsburgh NOW and later became NOW's national political director, devoting nearly all her time to the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment until 1982.

Under her leadership NOW helped defeat the Supreme Court nomination of Robert Bork and organized the 1989 March for Women's Lives and was instrumental in passing the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1988, which reinstated Title IX, the equal educational opportunity law.
