### NYC FVFNT TO HONOR FEMINISTS IN THE ARTS

VFA members, friends to present, honor, and discuss art within movement

A once-in-a-lifetime celebration and exhibit honoring feminists in the visual arts will take place November 1 to 10 at the National Arts Club on Gramercy Park in New York City co-sponsored by Veteran Feminists of America and Rockland Center for the Arts. The highlight will be an awards dinner November 6 honoring the artists, historians, critics and scholars who mobilized creative art to raise the consciousness of the world during the crucial years of our 1966 - 1980 Second Wave feminist revolution.

These honorees opened the world of art to women, brought great women artists of the past to our attention and created an important new genre - feminist art. This is the first time so many leading

feminist artists from around the country are joining together in a major exhibition of their art work.

Co-chairs of this historic event are VFA founder Suzanne Benton and Gloria Orenstein, a longtime member. Their distinguished committee includes Linda Stein, Diana Kurz, Susan Schwalb, Miriam Bruner, Sandi Straus and Cristina Biaggi. Exhibiting artists are donating 40% of their art sales to VFA. So this is a chance for our friends to advance our taxdeductible activities by taking home an historic work of feminist art, while also attending a thrilling event.

Festivities on November 6 will begin with a 2:30 to 5 pm panel discussion moderated by prominent art figures Glo-

The art exhibit will include numerous news-making works, ranging from the controversial historic "Red Flag" of Judy Chicago to a feminist quilt by Faith Ringgold.

Unveiled for the first time will be a new portrait of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, painted especially for this exhibit by worldrenowned feminist portrait painter Patricia Hill Burnett. VFA activist Kate Millett has also contributed a work for the exhibit/sale.

### An icon of the Feminist Movement has left us

Our beloved friend, colleague and feminist extraordinaire, a founder of Veteran Feminists of America, Gene T. Boyer passed away Tuesday, Aug. 19, 2003, at her home in Madison, Wisconsin. News of her imminent death came from Gene directly, in a card she wrote in response to the birthday card I'd sent her. **Dear Jacqui.** 

You cannot imagine how meaningful your card is to me at this time - my 78th birthday. I have just learned I have incurable cancer and a measurable remaining life span of probably less than a year. It lends a great sense of urgency to disposing of my papers, books and other memorabilia in appropriate ways. I think of it as the Legacy Project since I must abandon the book-writing which I had in mind unless I can get someone to help me quickly. Your words of love and affirmation are so significant to me now. You must know how important your friendship has been to me, and how much I hope all your dreams for VFA and for yourself will come true.

Until we meet again - Hasta la vista! Hugs and love! Gene.

I immediately alerted many, and the messages began pouring in; to her, in Madison, and to me, via email. A few days later we spoke by phone.

She was in good spirits and we joked

and laughed a bit . She wasn't afraid of going, in fact we talked about meeting friends on the "other side." I asked her to say hello to Catherine East. Wilma Scott Heide and others. She said she'd join the



feminist contingent and promised to help guide us in all our endeavors.

Even though she told me she had very little time left, I didn't expect it would be only a matter of days! So, when Burt called early on August 20th to report that she'd died (peacefully) it was a shock. Though we saw one another maybe once a year since 1990 (when we began talking about a reunion of pioneer feminists) we were in contact often by email and phone.

I never realized how much I'd miss her! She was so helpful, especially in financial and organizing areas. More important, she believed in me, and inspired me on. I am counting on her to continue to help VFA from the other side.

### A life dedicated to bettering women's lives

Gene was born on July 11, 1925, the daughter of Nat and Rene (Hiller) Cohen. As a member of the Status of Women Commission in Washington, D.C. for a national conference, she took part in the founding of NOW and was a NOW treasurer, a finance vice president and later president of the NOW Legal Defense and Education Fund. She led the National Conference Committee, was a co-founder of Veteran Feminists of America, and founded the Jewish Women's Coalition and the Wisconsin Women's Network. Gene and Burt, her husband of 58 years, owned and operated a furniture business in Beaver Dam for 32 years. She is survived by Burt, daughter, Bari; grandchildren, Brit and Brook; and brother, Robert Cohen.

Gene's papers will be kept in the Wisconsin Historical Society. Papers dealing with national organizing will be housed at the Schlesinger Library at Harvard University.. The fund will be used to help organize events in Wisconsin and other mid-west states to honor great feminists there who, Gene believed, are not properly credited for their leadership of the feminist movement. Members who learned of Gene's illness sent a message to her through the VFA office. Sadly, she didn't get to read them, but in our last conversation she asked that they be included in a card and placed in the Gene Boyer Legacy at the Wisconsin Historical Society. Messages ceived were faxed to Burt in time for the memorial service that Saturday, and later, with other messages, will be sent to the Wisconsin Historical Society.


#### A TREE FOR GENE..

After the sessions, Sheila Tobias, Lois Herr, and Linda Shavitz (Title IX Coordinator for Maryland) created an information packet for help in writing in part letters, presenting testimony and taking from hearings.

In addition to Smeal and ONeill the program included many well known VFA members--mother-of-us-all Betty Friedan, mother-of-Title-IX Bunny Sandler, motherof-math-for-girls Sheila Tobias, all-around activist Pat Reuss, new author Lois Herr, VFA president Jacqui Ceballos. Baltimore area talent told how it was thirty years ago: free lance journalist Melody Simmons, who successfully sued under Title IX for the right to interview male (football again!) athletes, and Helen Dale, President of Maryland Women for Responsive Government. Most exciting for all of us was being activists again! In the workshops the 65 well informed participants developed a program on how we could be most effective in cutting off attempts to put skids on our earlier gains. It was later accepted in the plenary The information packet was session, mailed within a month to all conference participants, and many disseminated the information though their own channels, including the VFA web page. And we did help! On July 11 the Bush administration announced there would be no changes in the procedural guidelines.

But, says Betty, VFA still needs to produce a conference focusing on the enormous change brought to American life by Title IX's elimination of discriminatory to women keep-them-out-quotas.

### THE GREATEST EXPERIMENT EVER PERFORMED ON WOMEN

For almost a century women
have been taking some form of
estrogen to combat the hot
flashes and other effects of
menopause and aging, and
recently to prevent everything
from osteoporosis to

Alzheimer's to heart disease. In some cases they received estrogen with progesterone "hormone therapy" as a

preventative, but did doctors know enough about estrogen and its effects to be widely prescribing it? Or were women the guinea pigs in what Barbara calls "The Greatest Experiment Ever Performed on Women." This groundbreaking book by women's health icon Barbara Seaman illuminates today's "menopause industry," tracing the history of estrogen use from its early purveyors to Nazi experimentation to the present, and looks at how WHY an experiment of this proportion could have been conducted without real knowledge of estrogen's effects to women's health.

Since the 1960s Barbara has been one of the lone voices questioning doctors and the pharmaceutical industry driving the research, marketing, and use of hormone replacement therapy. In 2002, several studies revealed that estrogen may cause more problems than it is correcting or preventing, and that in fact it has a dismal record in terms of

prevention.

### Report from Title IX event, November 2002:

### THREE PIVOTAL TO THE FEMINIST MOVEMENT INDUCTED TO VFA'S HALL OF FAME

Patsy Mink (1937-2002) as Congresswoman from Hawaii, was a tireless proponent of women's rights. She authored and introduced into the House Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Scheduled to receive a certificate of honor in person for her service to women, her sudden death caused her to be instead installed into the VFA's new Hall of Fame for recognition of deceased feminists. In a 2002 speech she said she had been rejected for admission to medical school and the rejection letter had said quite explicitly that she was rejected because she was a woman.

Pauli Murray (1910 to 1985) was denied admission to Harvard graduate school because she was a woman, not on the basis of race. She was a lawyer, labor and civil rights activist, college professor and author. Her prize winning Proud Shoes was reissued as Song in a Weary Throat. In what some would call retirement she became an Episcopalian Priest, the first African American woman to achieve this. Declaring Jane Crow to be as bad as Jim Crow she worked closely with Betty Friedan, Catherine East. Mary Eastwood and other founders of NOW to create the second wave of the feminist movement.

Ann London Scott was a Shakespearean Professor who left academia to work for NOW. She commuted from Baltimore to D.C. daily, and was gainfully employed at One Dupont Circle, as legislative Vice President of NOW defined and developed NOW's 1970's political agenda. At the L.A. NOW conference mike, she stood with a scroll touching the floor, pleading, "Trust me, I need NOW endorsement of all these

items." 1972 saw Congress pass ERA and Title IX and according to Ann at the time, "...just about everything we went for." She, Bunny Sandler, and others then lobbied hard to push government agencies to implement the provisions of those new 1972 laws.

### CERTIFICATES OF HONOR

for establishing and implementing Title IX and other feminist milestones were presented to:

Bernice Sandler - The "Mother" of Title IX. Sandler is a psychologist, an educator and an activist. Because of her efforts with WEAL (Women's Equity Action Alliance) some of the most prestigious universities were required by the Federal Contract Compliance (FCC) to take action on behalf of women and minorities in the early 1970's. Her indefatigable efforts to collect and distribute information about the barriers to women and girls in education persuaded Congresswoman Martha Griffiths to give a speech in Congress on discrimination against women in education, and later Congresswoman Edith Green to hold hearings on educational equity. Her data, along with her list of expert witnesses contributed to the growing awareness that the new legislation was justified.

Cynthia Brown - PEER advisory counselor, member Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, the coalition that had orchestrated the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964

Holly Knox - Conceptualizer and project leader of PEER, editor of "The Glass Slipper," chair of the Washington based Educa-

tion Task Force and the National Coalition on Women and Girls in Education.

Celia Steele—Deputy Director of PEER. Mary Jean Tully, who, as president of NOW's Legal Defense and Education Fund wrote the first successful grant proposal on behalf of women to the Ford Foundation to support Project on Equal Education Rights (PEER) which provided organizers with everything to monitor Title IX in their home districts.

# REMEMBERING Irene... a great feminist, artist and organizer

IRENE PESLIKIS – 10/7/43-11/29/02 – From Flushing, NY, Irene died of a stroke after a long illness. She was one of the principal founders and organizers of the women's art movement, especially on the east coast. She organized the first show of the Second Wave women artists, taught the first Women and Art course on a college campus at the State University of New York in Old Westbury and was a founder of the first feminist art school, the

Feminist Art Institute. .She was a founder of the New York Studio School for Drawing, Painting and Sculpture, which broke

away from Pratt in 1963 and opened in 1964 in the former Whitney Museum and is still functioning. With Pat Mainardi she founded the journal, Women and Art. She was a founder of NoHo gallery.

Her political cartoons were widely circulated in the dearly 1970's.

She was a founding member of Redstockings and a member of NY Radical Women.

Her paper, "Resistence to Consciousness" is printed in "NOTES FROM THE SEC-OND YEAR" She taught at several colleges, including the City College in New York.

She is survived by husband, Richard Castellana, her mother, brother, Michael and her friends who loved her dearly. Said Ann Forer, "She was loving, lively, generous and incredibly helpful and supportive.

Roz Baxandall and friends held a memorial service for her in May of 2003.
