VFA AND SEWALL BELMONT HOUSE CELEBRATE DC-AREA FEMINISTS WHO CHANGED AMERICA OCTOBER 30

The event and will take place from 5 to 8 pm at the Sewall Belmont House (144 Constitution Avenue NE, Washington, DC), the historic home of the National Woman's Party and of the late

FWCA's creator and editor, Barbara Love, who with the help of a handful of dedicated women collected the 2,200 bios and edited the monumental work, will share in honoring the 160 DC pioneer feminists cited in the book.

HELEN THOMAS TO BE HONORED

VFA will proudly honor the feminist hero Helen Thomas, a blue-ribbon journalist who has covered the White House as bureau chief for UPI during the Administrations of nine presidents. She was the first woman officer of the National Press Club, the first woman member and president of the White House Correspondents Association, and the first woman member of the Gridiron Club.

Other well-known honorees are Patricia Schroeder, former Congresswoman from Colorado; NOWs president, Kim Gandy, and former NOW president and founder and president of The Feminist Majority.

30TH ANNIVERSARY OF HOUSTON CONFERENCE TO BE CELEBRATED AT HUNTER COLLEGE NEW YORK NOVEMBER 9 and 10

On November 18-21, 1977, over 20,000 women met in Houston to evaluate the discrimination faced by American women and to develop recommendations for reform. Never before had the federal government financed a national gathering "to promote equal rights, equal opportunities and responsibilities for women." Never before had women come together from every area to focus on making changes to ensure justice and equality for women. And never before had such a diverse group gathered in one place to share the realities of their lives at that time

The conference made visible a women's movement that had spread beyond its original white middle-class base. Thirty-five percent of the delegates were nonwhite; nearly one in five was low-income; and Protestants were in the minority.

Under the brilliant leadership of Bella Abzug, the delegates enacted a National Action Plan with the Equal Rights Amendment as its centerpiece and 26 planks that included abortion and lesbian rights. Each state would work to achieve these goals and there would be yearly conferences to discuss progress. Sadly it did not happen.

But thirty years later this powerful conference is being remembered. Led by the Bella Abzug Leadership Institute and Girls Speak Out, a new generation of feminists is convening a two-day conference on November 9 and 10 at Hunter College (695 Park Avenue between 68-69 Streets) to build on the accomplishments of the Houston event and publish a 21st century plan.



Goals are to create and publish an updated plan of action based on the 26 planks; to educate participants about the current status of women and girls with respect to the 26 issues of concern; to advance the growth of the feminist movement and its role in the international women's movement,

Keynotes, panels and workshops will be open to the public, but an admission fee will be charged for the opening evening concert.

Conference organizers are led by Liz Abzug, president of the Bella Abzug Leadership Institute, Martha Baker, Elected Delegate, NY; Pam Elam, Elected Delegate, KY; Girls Speak Out Foundation; and Andrea Johnston, Convener. For more information: Martha Baker — msmarthabaker1@aol.com

And she hopes to alert feminists everywhere to watch for opportunities to memorialize Betty in their areas. Ginny is now forming a committee to explore how best this can be accomplished. Grace Welch reports on NOW conference in Detroit

On May 12, 2007, Mid-Suffolk Chapter of NOW on Long Island held its second annual Yoga Workshop Fundraiser to fund a college student to the NOW conference to represent our chapter at National's Young Ferninist Leadership Institute.

The event brought in \$950, ample to cover Jessica Osias' all-expensespaid trip to Detroit, where Jessica, a Women's Studies major sophomore at SUNY Stony Brook, attended her first NOW conference.

College students from across the country attended workshops such as "Because We're Still Not Equal." They learned what economic justice really means; they learned the difference between reproductive rights and reproductive justice. Male and female students were able to develop alliances and coalitions involving civil rights, religious, labor and other groups as participants shared their experiences in the field.

Emphasis on establishing NOW chapters on campus was reinforced by case histories of successes in this area, developing action networks, finding mentors and handling questions of credibility despite one's youth.

The final two workshops were devoted to "Running for Public Office" led by young women who have done it! With the high spirits and enthusiasm

SUZANNE BENTON AND DAUGHTER JANET BENTON





Suzanne Benton, an artist and an activist since early days of the movement is also a founder of VFA. Suzanne, who always used her art in feminist demonstrations, is a transculturalist and is often traveling to some remote part of the world. In 1996 VFA was honoring activists on NOW's 30th anniversary, but, Suzanne was in Bosnia. Janet, her

daughter accepted her medal of honor. No one present that evening will forget Janet's acceptance speech.. Many of us were raising children at the time and could identify. Here are excerpts. . Read them and cry,. And laugh!

It wasn't always easy having a mother dedicated to feminism and to becoming herself. I came home from third grade to find that my full-size baby carriage and baby doll who wet her pants, along with Barbie, her lovely accessories, and most of my stuffed animals, had been donated to a day-care center. While I got an appendectomy a few months earlier, Mom was marching through New York City streets with a procession of women wearing her metal masks, proclaiming the second coming of the great goddess. And after my parents divorced, I often came home to an empty house. It was a strange irony, the way that a joyous liberation and a freeing divorce sucked the joy from my life.

But I also received a treasure, one that I have come to understand as rare since hearing many people tell me what happened to the dreams, to the capacities of their mothers, and that is that my mother is a creative, strong, courageous woman who will never give up. The pride she has brought me, and the self-respect and assertiveness she has worked so hard to teach me, have proved more nutritive than hundreds of perfectly cooked meals.

So thank you for acknowledging Suzanne's thirty years of work on behalf of women. It means a lot to both of us.
