FLO KENNEDY

Excerpts from an interview

Civil Rights attorney/activist, writer, speaker, television host (her own show;) inspirator, nurturer, fearless defender of human rights; selfless, outspoken, outrageous, controversial and completely lovable human being.

Born Kansas City, February, 1916 the second of four daughters she was raised by loving parents, a mother who instilled pride and ambition, a father who gave them a sense of humor and spoiled them a bit.

"My father had his own two taxi cabs, but we were poor. My mother sewed and made us cute dresses. She thought we were the greatest. We lived in a 'po white trash' neighborhood; the kids would chase us and call us nigger. Once, in a moment of rashness, I turned around and chased them, and did they run! I was never afraid of white people after that. My whole theory is, anytime anyone is after you, turn and chase them, There's something vunerable about everyone."

In her early twenties she moved to Sugar Hill, (Harlem) and attended Columbia Law School on a grant given because of her handicap, a pro- gressive congenital back disability which has her today confined to a wheelchair. I asked why had she gone into law? "Why not? I always aimed for the top. They tried to discourage me; said I was 'puny,' the law books were too heavy. I said a baby is heavier."

Women lawyers were expected to be legal secretaries in those days, but Flo was lucky. She says of the firm that hired her, "The guys liked me and let me do some legal work. There was one

women lawyer in the firm, She taught me a lot. So soon I opened my own office." Rap Brown, Charlie Parker and Billie Holiday were clients.

Once a judge told me, "Next time you come to court, dress like a lawyer". Your honor, I answered, if you'll be dressed like a man, I'll dress like a woman. Any time you see a man in a woman's garb, run like a turkey, cause baby they're in a sexist profession!

Flo was at the founding meeting of New York NOW at a millionaire's mansion on the upper east side. She shook things up when she talked about boycotts. "I told them they should attack the advertizing industry and the media for their degrading depiction of women. We formed the first Image Committee."

I could understand feminism because the patterns were so similar to discrimination against blacks—almost parallel—so it was easy to get the psychology and know the techniques to fight them.

All I had to do was transfer the thinking

from the black community to women, and you have the same thing.

In the seventies Flo did the talk circuit with Gloria Steinem, cracking everyone up while instilling them with courage. Among her books, "The Abortion Rap", written with Diane Schulter Abrams and "Color Me Flo".

Flo's melieu was demonstrations, confrontations. I remember her especially at The New York Times demo in '67. (to stop the sexi-grated help-wanted ads). One cop was very hostile. Flo strode up to him authoratively, looked him in the eye and asked, "What's the trouble, officer? I'm an attorney". He blanched and retreated and soon he was protecting us from hostile passersby.

Her flat was ever open to us, a haven and a school, where we could help ourselves to a plate of soul food always cooking on the stove, and get a "Flo Fix"—a mixture of courage, inspiration, ideas, Floisms, and bask in the warmth of her unconditional love.

VETERAN FEMINISTS IN DALLAS REUNITE
