WOMEN'S LIBERATION'S 30th

Of all VFA events, this one had the most feeling of community.

Un December 13, 1997 women from Maine to California came to New York to celebrate, to renew friendships and their commitment to radical feminism. Ros Baxandall welcomed her sisters. We are here to celebrate our past that hasn't been as visible or as celebrated as we'd like. The women's liberation movement is the biggest social movement in history and this is the first national reunion. We are all veterans of the feminist wars. Some of us have been scarred and remain scarred, sick, unemployed or underemployed. Many of our ideals and dreams have become real; others have been co-opted, betrayed or mushed unrecognizably. I'd like this to be both a celebration of the past and a real means of carrying on into the future. Much remains to be done, and we can't do it as individuals. We need a movement more organized than the first to keep on carrying

on. JO Freeman took over, promising organization and efficiency, and a gong to stop the over-enthusiastic. Heather Booth, a founder of first women's liberation group (Chicago), gave an exciting speech and set the tone. IN MEMORIUM

TONI CARABILLO

When Toni died last October 28, the movement lost a leader. She was 71 and had been ill for several years. Tony hailed from Jackson Heights, Queens, graduated in American Literature from Middlebury College and earned a master's degree at Columbia University. Later, in Los Angeles working as a writer and graphic designer, her feminist buttons were pushed. Her job ended after she participated in a survey of women employees showing discrimination in salaries and advancement in her company. Toni joined NOW, and soon was a pillar of the organization. She was president of the L.A. chapter, PR VP of national, co-edited the national newspaper, and was a major fund raiser and organizer for the ERA. With Ellie Smeal, Peg Yorkin and Katherine Spiller and Judith Meulil, she created the Feminist Majority and was vice president. With her lifetime partner, Judith Meuli, and June Czida, she wrote "The "Feminist Cronicles", a textbook for women's studies courses. Toni and Judy owned a graphic arts company since 1970. In '88 they co-authored the book, The Feminization of Power". To remember her send a contribution to the Ferninist Majority Foundation., 8105 W 3rd St, Los Angeles.

ESTHER PETERSON

Age 91. VFA member, she died before we could honor her. Peterson was key in establishing the first Presidential Commission on the Status of Women. She was a labor organizer and worked to improve working conditions, particularly for women.



PHINEAS INDRITZ

Phineas died October 15 at age 81, of cancer. A civil rights lawyer and feminist activist, he gave legal help to NOW and other groups. Among his last achievements was getting the National Counsel of the American Veterans Committee (AVC) to join the amicus curiae brief in the New York Supreme Court case of Long Island Gynecological Services v 1103 Stewart Ave Association, which ruled that a landlord may not evict a reproductive health clinic. Phineas wrote in October of '96 regretting that he was ill and couldn't join us to celebrate NOW's 30th.. Please give my warm regards to the VFA members and others(at the NOW celebratio), including Betty Friedan, Gene Boyer, Mary Eastwood, Sonia Fuentes, Muriel Fox, Richard Graham, Dorothy Haener, Aileen Hernandez, Sylvia Roberts, Ellie Smeal, Molly Yard, and all the other great heroic advocates for achieving the elimination of gender discrimination in the country. VFA honored Phineas in '94 in Washington. (Too few men like you, Phineas!).

SEY CHESSLER

Sey was editor of Redbook magazine, a dedicated supporter of women's rights, and a member of VFA.

SARA AMATNIEK

The Sara of the well known feminist, Kathy Sarachild. Sara Amatniek was prominent in her own right. She was an artist, a civil rights and feminist activist. She worked with Westchester NOW was an early Redstockings member, and active in the National Associaton of Women Artists. Her work was exhibited widely, to much acclaim. She died in December '96 and is survived by her husband and her children, including Redstockings founder, Kathy Sarachild...

BEATRICE BARON

Bea died by her own hand, in Spring of last year. She was a member of New York NOW since 1967. Bea was dearly loved and we wish we had known she needed help. Dell Williams
