\*Technical careers are expanding rapidly, and will provide many job opportunities in the future. Be sure that all students, male and female, explore these opportunities.

\*Nontraditional careers. Many occupations which have traditionally recruited women are now heavily recruiting men (and vice versa). For example, female engineers and male nurses are being sought by many employers.

  - Are you skilled in writing? speaking? computer operating? typing?
- 3. Know Your Values. Place these factors in priority order for yourself:

Money Security Travel

Independence Adventure

Match your priorities to your career choice.

- 4. Research Job Information. Match your skills, values, and interests to those of various jobs. Learn the requirements to enter a given field.
- 5. Find Out About Career Trends. Which career areas show growth potential? Which areas have few opportunities to enter the field?
- 6. Talk to People. Learn all you can about what people do for a living. Make as many contacts as you can.
